## Yard Waste Pick-up

Yard waste includes debris from routine residential yard maintenance only. It does not include debris generated from land clearing or tree removal. All vegetation must be kept separate from other debris and be dirt and sand free. Yard waste is collected manually by a different trash truck than the garbage and is limited to 6 cubic yards per week (the equivalent of 3 standard refrigerators).

All yard waste with the exception of tree branches and palm fronds, must be containerized in standard 32-50 gallon cans or sealed plastic bags. Containers with contents cannot weigh more than 50 pounds. Branches must be 6 feet or less in length and 50 pounds or less in weight.

Do not mix yard waste with garbage or any other debris that does not meet the above guidelines. If your debris is considered nonconforming and is not collected you may do one of the following:

- Pay your hauler \$9.00 per cubic yard to pick up as is
- Correct the debris to meet required collection guidelines. Once corrected it will be picked up on your next scheduled service day or
  - Transport the material directly to an SWA disposal site or permitted facility. Contact SWA Customer Information Services at 866-792-4636 for the nearest location. If you elect to transport your yard waste yourself, there will be a disposal fee charged.

## What is Labor Day?\*

Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country.

Through the years, the nation gave increasing emphasis to Labor Day. The first governmental recognition came through municipal ordinances passed during 1885 and 1886. From these, a movement developed to secure state legislation. By 1894, many states adopted the holiday in honor of workers, and on June 28 of 1894, Congress passed an act making the first Monday in September of each year a legal holiday.

## **HOUSEHOLD HAZARD WASTE**



Household hazardous waste (HHW) is NEVER collected curbside. A few examples of household hazardous waste are:

- Used motor oil
- Rechargeable or auto batteries
- Propane tanks
- Fluorescent light bulbs
- Oil based paint
- Pesticides

Household hazardous waste maybe dropped at any Solid Waste Facility (SWA) designated Household Hazardous Waste collection site at no charge to Palm Beach County residents. ### ARE YOU READY FOR A HURRICANE?\*

Here's what you can do to prepare for such an emergency. Understanding the difference between a hurricane **WATCH** and a hurricane **WARNING** helps.

- WATCH: Hurricane conditions are possible in the specified area of the WATCH, usually within 36 hours
- WARNING: Hurricane conditions are expected in the specified area of the WARNING, usually within 24 hours.

## Prepare a Personal Evacuation Plan

• Identify ahead of time where you could go if you are told to evacuate.

### Con't: HURRICANE

## HURRICANE (CON'T)

- Keep the phone numbers of these places handy as well as a road map of your locality. You may need to take alternative or unfamiliar routes if major roads are closed or clogged.
- Listen to NOAA Weather Radio or TV stations for evacuation instructions. If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

## Gather Items for a Disaster Kit Including:

- First aid kit and essential medications
- Instructions on how to turn off electricity, gas, and water if advised to do so,
- One gallon of water per person per day for at least 14 days for drinking and sanitation,
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both,
- Flashlight and extra batteries,
- Can opener for food,
- Towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation, and
- Any other items that you feel are critical for your well-being (see <u>www.redcross.org</u> for a more complete list).

## Prepare for High Winds

- Install hurricane shutters or install plywood boards on each window.
- Remove diseased and damaged limbs of trees and remove any branches that could cause harm to yourself or your home.
- Bring inside any lawn furniture, outdoor decorations or ornaments, trash cans, hanging plants and anything else that can be picked up by the wind.

# Identify What to do When a Hurricane WARNING is Issued

- Listen to the advice of local officials, and leave if they tell you to do so.
- Complete preparation activities.
- If you are not advised to evacuate, stay indoors and away from windows.
- Be aware that the calm "eye" is deceptive; the storm is not over. The worst part of the storm will happen once the eye passes over and the winds blow from the opposite direction.
- Be alert for tornadoes. Tornadoes can happen during a hurricanes and after it passes
